Joseph Cantrell, JD

Joseph Cantrell is the Director of State Affairs and Community Relations for the American College of Rheumatology. The ACR represents over 9,500 rheumatologists and rheumatology health professionals in the United States and across the world. As a leading advocate for rheumatology, the ACR works with decision makers in Washington, D.C. and in states around the nation to improve policy outcomes. The ACR's advocacy focuses on improving access to rheumatologists and rheumatologic care, improving the practice climate for rheumatologists, enhancing patient access to treatments, and increasing public funding for medical research.
